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Ministry Message

Happy New Year, everyone - and 2017 promises to be a very exciting year in the life of Holy Trinity and St Mark's. Many of you will have seen the very visible signs that work on the roof at Holy Trinity is now underway in earnest, with the scaffolding now inside as well as out. Elsewhere in this edition, you can read a report on the progress of the work, and see some pictures of what is happening inside church. The church is still open during the day, so if you haven't been to a service recently, do pop in and see what is happening. It is very much an on-going project, where things may change on a daily basis, so we'll try to keep everyone up-to-date with progress. Have a look at the website, and make sure you are on the list to receive the weekly newsletter by email. You can even check out how the scaffolding was done if you search for "holy trinity scaffolding" on youtube.com.

In this very real way, we have begun to achieve our vision to 'Raise the Roof and Open the Door'. The roof will be repaired, but more than that, we want to 'raise the roof' with our praise and worship in church. The porch will be replaced, which will make it easier for people to come into the church, but more than that, we want to develop that two way link between the church and the community we serve; to bring people into the church, and to take the church out into the community. To do that, we have embarked upon our own 'Vision Course'. We welcomed **Dave Champness**, the Diocesan Vision Co-ordinator to our 10.30 service on January 15th, and he talked to us about our Diocesan Vision, Vision **2026**, and inspired us to think about how we develop our vision for our own church. We undertook the 'Healthy Church Audit' last autumn, and it revealed that perhaps we weren't very clear about what our vision was, or how we would attain it; or, if we were, maybe we weren't very good at letting people know what that vision was. So, we have launched our own Vision Course - a series of 5 sessions on Saturday mornings, when everyone is invited to come along to reflect, with prayer and bible study, to join in discussions, and make suggestions - and enjoy bacon buns and coffee! In the first session on 21st January, we considered how we recognise a Healthy Church. We looked again at the areas in which we feel we, as a church, are quite healthy and tried to identify three areas in which we felt we could develop further, in order to ensure growth in the church - using a very wide definition of 'growth'.

The three areas we suggested focussing on were :

- developing as a prayerful church
- developing our personal faith journeys through Bible Study
- developing our work in and for the community we serve

The sessions continue to look at the other aspects of Vision 2026 : Transforming Communities, Making Disciples, Being Witnesses and Growing Leaders. Everyone is welcome to come along to any of the sessions - you do not have to make a commitment to come to them all, and how you take part is entirely up to you. God is at work in the lives of people today, and we want this good news of great joy to be part of our community. Put yourself where God can work through you - be part of the discernment of what God has planned for us.

The audit that we undertook (and many thanks to all those who completed the audit forms and sent in suggestions and comments) told us where we are now. The Vision course will help us to discern where God wants us to be. We will then produce our own **Mission Action Plan** to set out how we will reach that destination. To use the analogy of a journey, we know where we are starting from, and we know where we want to get to. To reach our destination, we will need a plan or a map to help and guide us - the Vision Course will tell us **what** we want to achieve - the **Mission Action Plan** will tell us **how**, with God's help and guidance, we hope to achieve it.

As part of our aim to make worship accessible and inclusive, we are planning to have one service a month at Holy Trinity at 10.30am which is not a communion service. These will include special services for Mothering Sunday, St. George's Day, Celebrating Baptism and families, Fathers' Day, Harvest, Junior Church presentations and Remembrance. Following last year's success, February's Family Praise will be :

All creatures great and small.....

On Sunday 19th February at 10.30am, we will have our Pet Service. You are welcome to bring along your pets - or perhaps a photo or other reminder of your pet - to a special service where we remember all God's creatures, and give thanks for all the joy that our pets bring into our lives.

So, much to look forward to in 2017 - and you are all invited to be part of it!







Treasurer's Message

Treasurer Andy Hampshire will be writing a regular contribution to the Messenger in the future.

In this first article, Andy explains how we can help to boost the church's finances.

I have just finalised the Church's annual accounts for the first time since taking over as Treasurer last year. My first task is to thank all those who have welcomed and helped me to understand how the church and its finances work. As a result producing the accounts has gone really smoothly, with no hitches. So, thank you everyone - I find the work of the Treasurer to be both stimulating and enjoyable, so I'll stay on if you'll have me!

Everyone will have seen that the work on the church roof has now started and it is pleasing to note that the funding of the project is sound. The focus for Holy Trinity's finances will inevitably now turn back to the day-to-day running costs and budgets - more on that around the time of the AGM in April. Inevitably, there will always be the need for more income, and parishioners are already most generous in providing over 70% of income through direct giving - standing orders, envelopes etc - and this will continue to be the most important source of income in the future. However, there are other ways to help, and if you have ever bought anything on the internet read on....

Holy Trinity has been a member of 'easyfundraising.org' since 2009 and there are currently 16 individuals who use this to raise funds for us. A total of £654.35 has been raised and it is easy to see that if there were more members using the site more regularly the potential income would be much larger. The site pays us a small amount of money each time it is used to access a site you are buying from - no catches. So why not give it a go?

The site is free to use, and covers all types of purchases, large and small, from holidays to gas & electricity, white goods, clothes etc, etc. The price you pay for goods is exactly the same as it would be if you went to the seller directly and purchases are just as secure.

So, before you turn over the page, why not log on to **www.easyfundraising.org**, register your email address and choose **Holy Trinity Church, Bolton-le-Sands** as your preferred beneficiary.

I'll update the results of your efforts in a future article.

Health & Safety

With the first phase of the scaffolding being erected inside church some additional control measures have been introduced. This is to make sure that everybody is safe.

- **Slip, trip and fall** with so much plastic covering on the carpets and pews, take extra care and always look where you are going. Do not rush, and seek assistance if required.
- **Barrier tape** do not cross or pull down the barrier tape -it is designed to show 'no go areas' and to identify safe walkways
- Access to the kitchen/toilet please make sure you use the designated walkway as defined by the barrier tape.
- **Coffee/tea area** please do not overcrowd the Fellowship area at the back of church. Be aware of limited space, and use pews for seating areas if necessary.
- Make sure you know where the designated exit point is in the event of an incident.
- **Chancel steps** during communion services, there will always be two people present to provide assistance.

PLEASE NOTE - as the work progresses, there may be some addition or changes to this advice. Please make sure you check and observe any notices and updates. If you see anything you are not sure about, or if you spot anything which you think could be a hazard, please report it Nancy, the Church Wardens or any of the team on duty.

New year Message from the Bishop of Blackburn



As a New Year presents itself with all its opportunities and challenges, I sense there is an anxious uncertainty about the future. No-one knows what the Trump Presidency will bring. A number of fierce regional conflicts could easily explode into something more widespread and serious, shattering the current rather fragile world peace.

As we await the judgement of the Supreme Court, who will make the decisions about Brexit and when will our departure from the EU actually take place? Meanwhile the unpredictability of ongoing terrorist activity means no-one can be complacent.

All of the above, without any reference to difficult personal circumstances people may be facing, is enough to create an anxiety and even a fear about 2017. That is not scaremongering; it is just saying it as it is. But does the Christian Church and its teaching have any comfort or teaching to alleviate those fears?

Our convictions rest on two attributes that God has revealed of Himself. He is good and powerful. He will achieve His purpose for His created order, which (despite what can appear to be no progress, or even backward steps) will come to pass. If we surrender the belief that God is sovereign and that the affairs of the world are not running out of control, we will find ourselves in a very scary and vulnerable place.

I know that in the presence of terrible evil and suffering it is hard to hold to the belief, quoting the words of the hymn, that 'God is working His purpose out as year succeeds to year' but the alternative is to admit that there is no justice and that evil can run riot without any consequences of accountability.

That all sounds rather serious but, as I wish the people of Lancashire God's blessing for the New Year, it is in the confidence that we need not fear the ultimate future.

God is the beginning and the end and He will have His way. As another popular hymn puts it, He is 'Lord of the years' and that includes 2017!

Raise the Roof, Open the Door. Work Gathers Momentum:

The contractors Lloyd and Smith have made a good start in the New Year with the team fully established on site.

The external and internal scaffolds are complete. The good news is that the internal scaffold will not extend any further forward towards the chapel which means that access to the organ and the vestries is maintained, (as long as Ian can negotiate the obstacle course). Any work on the chapel ceiling will be done from a temporary mobile scaffold when required. The bad news is that the scaffold in the nave extended further into the centre pews than expected. This was necessary to allow access to the nave beams. We are now restricted in the number of pews available for seating but we are making the best use of the space available. We can only ask for your patience as we try to conduct worship as usual.

The chancel roof has been stripped of slates and is being prepared for the new slates. We are using the opportunity provided by the scaffold to revise the lighting in the Nave area with a view to replacing the halogen lamps with low energy LED lamps.

The inner porch has been removed and the oak panels retained for use later in the project. The community area will be more useful when the work is complete.

Saise the Roof



John Sparks

John was a well-known and very much respected member of our community, who gave a great deal of time, energy and commitment to the village which had become his home. John died in December, and his funeral was held at Holy Trinity Church on **Thursday 22nd December**. Thanks to the members of his family for the following extract from the eulogy which was given at the service.



John was born in Salford on the **15th December 1929**, he was the only child of Henrietta and Morrison, and his parents famously proclaimed, "He was so good, they lost the pattern". He came to Bolton-Le-Sands as an evacuee in 1939, aged 9, complete with gas mask and label. He went to the village school and then onto Lancaster Royal Grammar School. A very keen sportsman, he represented his school at Rugby and Cricket, and took his sporting prowess outside of school, playing for the under 16 local football team. An active member of the Parish, even at an early age of 9, he used to help local farmers after school and on Sundays, pumped the organ in church (whilst reading a comic). He was a member of the choir for many years.

It was in Bolton-le-Sands at the age of 16 when he first met Joy at a local dance on June 21st, 1946. Having courted for two years, they became engaged at 18, when John sadly had to take leave for his 2 years of national service. During these years, they wrote to each other every single day (costing a small fortune in stamps). After completing his National Service, Joy and John married at 20, on 3rd June, 1950, in Holy Trinity Church, where 50 years later they would renew their vows. A year after their marriage, John joined the Manchester Police which ultimately saw the happy couple relocate to Cheadle, in Cheshire.

John was a fiercely devoted husband to Joy, never failing a single day in 66 years – over 24,000 days – to tell her, "I love you". Then came the children. Their first son Michael was born in 1952, followed soon after by Chris in 1956, with Lyn eventually swinging the sex ratios in 1962. A dedicated and loving father to his three children, his family hold nothing but warm-hearted memories of their time together.

A staunch advocate of the caravan holiday, they toured Europe enjoying snow picnics, camping holidays and even towed the caravan as far as Rome on several occasions. A natural entrepreneur, he decided one day to build a boat – with no prior knowledge of woodwork or anything remotely nautical. His masterpiece was named Micrlyn, an amalgam of the names of this three children. What followed were endless happy weekends sailing around the local lake and even trips onto the open ocean, when the boat accompanied the caravan (on the roof of the ever-reliable Vauxhall Victor Estate).



In 1976, after his 26-year tenure with the Manchester Police, he became an enforcement officer for South Lakeland Council, where he spent 15 years touring the Lake District, cracking the whip with over-zealous farmers. Time moved on and 1983 saw the dawning of a new era; the grandchildren. Peter was followed by David, Alan, Marc, Chris, Victoria and finally a second Peter.

It was during this time that John was extremely active in the village he so loved since his first arrival during the war. For many years he was chairman of both the Parish Council and School Governors. He also organised the first responders group, raised money for the new Tennis Club and facilitated the building of the Scout Hut by accessing Lottery Funding. As a loving husband, father, father-in-law to Gwen and John, Grandad and Great-Grandad (a subsequent 4 great-grandchildren appeared; Joe, Olivia, Grace and Oscar), he was unfailing with his affections and consistent with his values. He was so proud of all the family, enjoying much of his final years following their journeys through Facebook.

John always liked people. Forever gregarious, he would search for the good in those he met, share his opinions, make everyone feel welcome and would always be the first to volunteer his services. He truly was a beacon in a frequently dark world, offered clarity in obscurity and has set an example for all of us to follow. His family and the wider community, will miss him endlessly and unreservedly.

Bolton le Sands Men's Group

The monthly meeting of the Bolton-le-Sands Men's group took place in the Old Boys' School on **9 January** when the speaker was **Brian Crawley** on Back packaging in Knoydart. The trip took place in 1990, when Brian and his wife, Louise, and two dogs, went to Scotland in their campervan. First, they went up to Lochalsh and Loch Duich, where they saw Eilan Donan and its well-known castle, which was restored in the early 1900's following destruction after the 1745 Rising.

From there, they continued to Loch Hourn, passing Glenelg with its very narrow crossing to Skye on the way. On arrival at Armisdale, the camper was parked up and the backpacking journey begun. The first thing was to cross over Loch Hourn to the Knoydart Peninsula, a very remote area of the country. The local postman was persuaded to give them a lift in his boat, something which he had done a number of times to backpackers.

Once on Knoydart, the journey began, following a path close to the shore. There were a number of pictures showing the wild, uninhabited countryside and coming round to Sandaig, not the one where Gavin Maxwell was based. Views were had across Loch Nevis to the area behind Mallaig. Loch Nevis is said to mean Loch of Heaven and Loch Hourn Loch of Hell, so they were between Heaven and Hell for the back packaging part of the trip.

The village of Inverie was reached, where there was a pier, one which has now been replaced, for boats to Mallaig. In this area there is the only stretch of road on the peninsula. It is an estate road and not connected at all to the road system, even though on the mainland. At the end of the road is Inverie House, which was the seat of absentee landlord Lord Brocket, a Nazi sympathiser during the time of the Second World War. Now, the Estate is owned by the Knoydart Foundation.

From near there were two tracks, the one to the left being the one taken, going up by the Inverie River to Lochan an Dubh Lochain, the Black Lochan, where the night was spent before continuing on and over the pass and down again to Loch Hourn. Near Mam Barrisdale, Brian and Louise met a party of Royal Engineers, the only people seen apart from at Inverie.

It was then a case of going along an old road over headlands and by the shore to Kinlochhourn, where Brian and Louise camped for the night, They then turned west for Armisdale and the camper, having trekked about thirty miles.

At the very beginning of this month I looked through the kitchen window. At the top of the upper lawn I could see something white. I was certain what I could see and went to have a look. Sure enough, I was right—it was my first clump of snowdrops in bloom this year. It always has quite large flowers. (Unfortunately I did not take a picture and now they are all but gone. This picture is of another clump at the edge of the lawn.)



This particular clump of snowdrops is always the first one to bloom, a week or two before the others follow on. They have done this for many years and I always keep an eye out for them. Now, all my several hundred other snowdrops are following on and coming into bloom. Other bulbs and plants will follow on bringing colour to the garden.

It struck me that this bunch of snowdrops is like some of the prophets of old. They appear and tell me of the glorious display which is to come. The Old Testament prophets came to tell the Jewish people what was to come. Admittedly, a lot of the predictions are very gloomy, and we can be certain that there will be gloomy times as it is still winter. However, there were those prophets predicting the coming of the Messiah and the saving of us from our sins.

How many of you remember when we used to have 'Snowdrop Sunday' when bunches of snowdrops were brought to church for distribution to various people and the hospital?

But above the Angels there seems to be a space rocket waiting to take them on to heaven. Did the architect, in about 1880, have a premonition of today's space exploration? We will



never know but suffice it to say that he gave us a beautiful collection of stained glass on all four walls. We keep the Church open on weekdays so do call again.

Our ladies worked hard over the year to make items, sort and produce the finished wrapped shoe boxes for **Samaritan's Purse / Christmas Child**. These boxes were given to children in need around the world. I do not know how many boxes our ladies have done, but I am guessing quite a number.
